An Open Letter to the User Community on Digital Copyright Infringement:

The Recording Industry Association of America, Inc. (RIAA) and movie producers (Time Warner and Universal Studios) and others in the media industry have ramped up their campaign to stop the download and file-sharing of copyrighted materials produced by their members. Internet Service Providers (ISP) and organizations such as the universities who are pseudo-ISP providers are the targets of requests to stop the copyright infringement under section 512 of the Digital Millennium Copyright Act (DMCA). We at Mansfield University see a steady stream of requests to shut down users for copyright infringement, particularly those individuals who are sharing files with peer-to-peer software such as Bit Torrent. Not everyone agrees that downloading and file-sharing is copyright infringement. While this may be debatable, Mansfield University will comply with the law when we receive a request to shutdown a user for copyright infringement or other internet abuse.

The infringement notification identifies the user by IP address on our network (the address attached to the computer port to which you are connected). We disconnect that port as a result of the notification. This results in your inability to access our computer network or the Internet to which we are connected until you have complied with the request to remove the infringing software from your computer system. We notify the requestor that we have removed you from the network (stopped the infringement). When a student notifies us that they do not have internet access, we will work with them to remove the software and get them back on line. The case is referred to the Residence Life Judicial Board for disciplinary sanction. Two abuses of the download policy result in termination of internet service for the semester. For employees, the case is referred to the appropriate vice president.

In addition to direct infringement requests, Mansfield University must comply with the Higher Education Opportunity Act of 2008 which requires that universities monitor for activity consistent with copyright infringement and educate our campus about the misuse. Mansfield uses a firewall and network access control software to limit activity which indicates file sharing. Our users are educated about the copyright laws in their classes, with library training and via our web page.

We are not singled out at Mansfield University as the RIAA and the movie entertainment providers exercise their copyright infringement rights.

The Higher Education Opportunity Act requires colleges and universities to offer students alternatives to illegal downloading and file sharing. Mansfield University does not subscribe to services of this nature on your behalf.

Downloads, gaming and other non-academic uses of the Mansfield Network

is also restricted. We want to be certain that our shared network bandwidth is available for the academic mission, hence our policy on high-bandwidth applications is listed below.
